



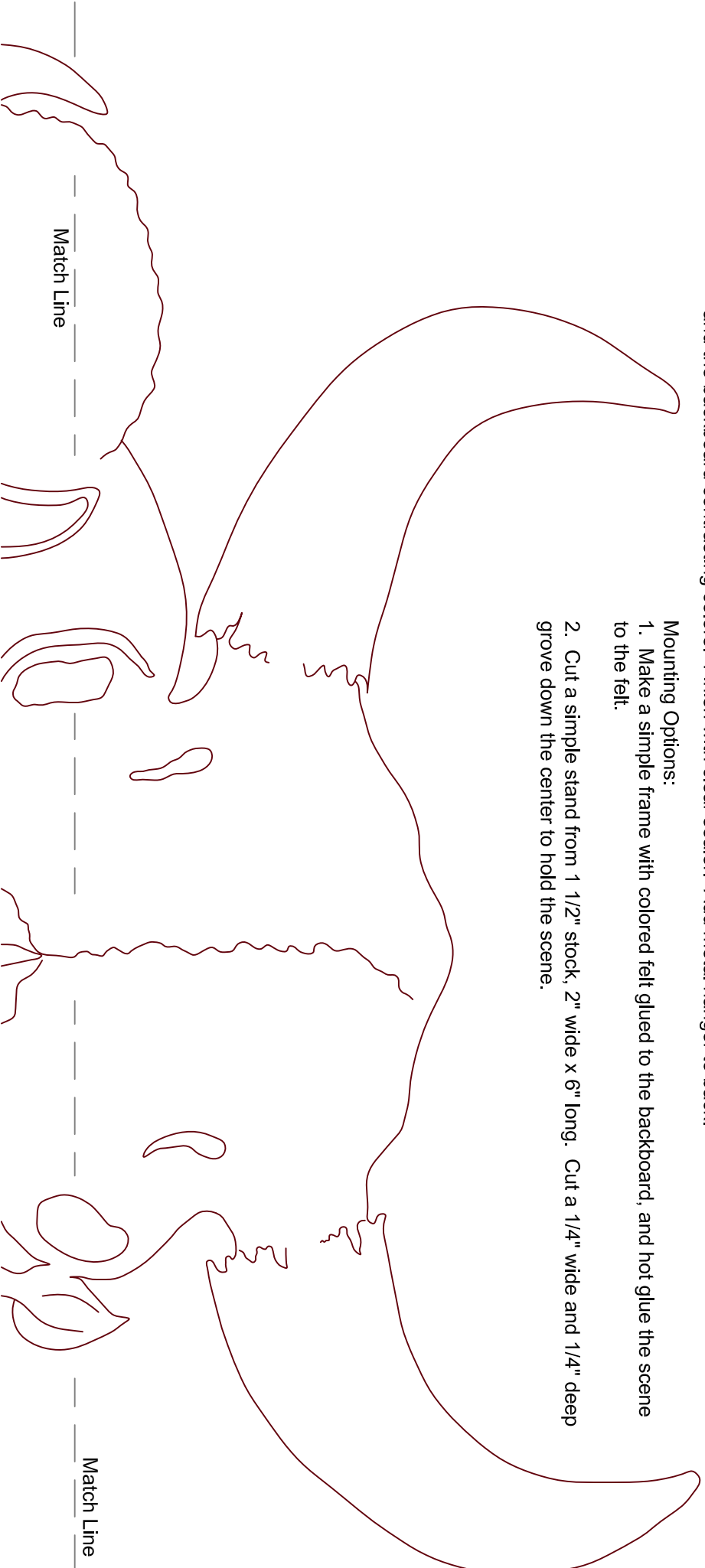
# WP-704 Buffalo Skull by OTB Patterns.

There are many ways to complete this project. Following are a few ideas to get you started.

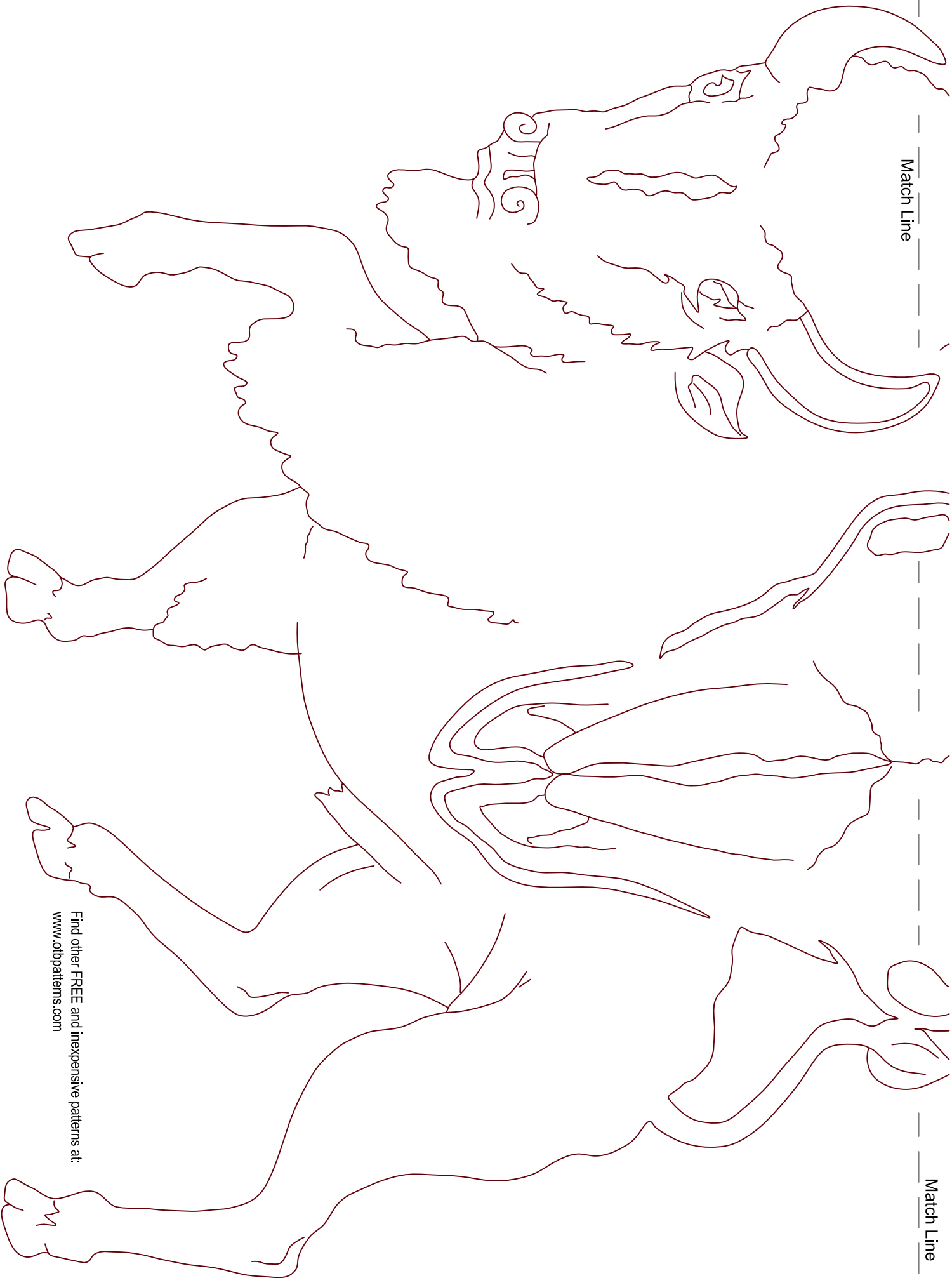
1. Start with 2 pieces of birch plywood about 12" x 14".
2. This design is delicate and must be cut and handled carefully. First, drill 1/16" dia. pilot holes to pass blade through stock in one piece. Use a spiral blade to minimize turning the project. Small detail lines are also much easier to cut. Cut small details last to minimize vibration. Be sure to stop your cuts as shown on the pattern or you might end up with many small pieces.
3. Shape the second piece (backboard) as an oval.
4. Trim edges with razor knife and sand with 150 grit sandpaper. Stain the Buffalo Skull, and the backboard contrasting colors. Finish with clear sealer. Add metal hanger to back.

#### Mounting Options:

1. Make a simple frame with colored felt glued to the backboard, and hot glue the scene to the felt.
2. Cut a simple stand from 1 1/2" stock, 2" wide x 6" long. Cut a 1/4" wide and 1/4" deep groove down the center to hold the scene.
